


Wardens Report

We spent the whole of 2024 in vacancy. However, with the help of numerous people, either ordained or lay ministers, we managed to continue to provide our full service pattern for Sundays. The wardens are very grateful to all who stepped in to help.

At the last PAGM Helen Geeson stepped down as warden and Ian Baird-Smith took over the role. We are very grateful for Helen's tireless work over the last few years most of which went unseen by the majority of the congregation.

The fabric of the church building and churchyards continues to be monitored and there have been improvements made to the church building and in the graveyards. Some interior paintwork has been repaired along with modifications to the toilet facilities along with other things including replacement of the old gas cooker with a new all electric cooker which provides much safer cooking. We lost a large tree from the Millennium Churchyard during the August storm and had to have most of the remaining trunks removed. However, the work we have done over the year has strengthened our relationships with our neighbours who were very thankful that we acted swiftly.

Finally, Trevor Gatie and Anthony Hustwayte agreed to be Deputy Wardens and are taking on numerous roles for us. Many thanks to them and to everyone who helps in the running of the church as we continue to strive to be a thriving Parish Church for our community and represent God's love for all.

It has been an exciting and busy time for Churches Together in Southwell with unity of purpose and an visible presence in the community as has not been seen in several years. There have been market stalls at key times of year, prayer for the community and church unity, corporate worship such as the Week of Prayer for Christian unity, the Lent course, an Easter holiday club organised by Collaborate (subgroup of children & young peoples' leaders) and prayer support for schools & Brackenhurst. We are also linked closely to CMJ (The Church's Ministry Among Jewish People) based near Kirklington).

The most exciting & challenging initiative to date is the Pentecost prayer 'Thy Kingdom Come' 24-7 prayer space, called 'The Lighthouse', running from 29th May - 8th June. It is based at The Wheatsheaf pub and will culminate in an ecumenical service of celebration on Pentecost, to thank God for all that He is doing in our town and beyond. Diocesan & Deanery Synods

Peter Harris sits on the Diocesan Synod from the Deanery Synod. As a member he also sits on the Bishop's Council and was re-elected last year to the Diocesan Board of Education.

We have no Area Dean at present but our Lay Chair is Michael Wilson of St Giles, Balderton. We usually meet in person, but we are able to have hybrid meetings that reduces the travel - but with a consequential reduction in the inter-personal elements. Some of the meetings have been held in churches with

traditional pews - something that does preclude full engagement.

Parish share update and Deanery Allocation for 2025/6 has taken up our time and I would like to add my huge 'well done' for the contributions made in 2024/5 with 96.1% from the Newark and Southwell Deanery for the Share HTS gave 100% of the requested contribution Please see 'How the Deanery spend the Parish Share' https://drive.google.com/file/d/1HDXm1nOricsKCBTNBG1ymaOzGAA1F_xP/view

The Parish Refresh is available and the PCC are considering our next steps. However, one of the main issues that I will be pursuing is the relationship between our school and churches. I regard school as church - especially in Church Schools of which we have four in our town. We are looking to support much more integration between the churches and schools and their families so that we are encouraging the journey to faith in all our people. The Director of Diocesan Education Nigel Frith proposed '20 Things That We Could Do To Help Our Schools' and we should reflect how many more of these we could do.

Peter is also one of the five elected lay members of the General Synod from the Diocese. Report from General Synod February 2025

Synod is, necessarily, a complex and parliamentary process. It is not easy to negotiate but fairly well understood. Ian Boothroyd posed four questions and an amendment [not supported] and Peter Harris submitted two speakers cards but was not called. The tearoom was busy, from 08h00 to the end of the days -around 19h00 - with discussion on the new Archbishop of Canterbury, as well as other issues of the day! Days start with collective worship and there are a number of fringe meetings at lunch time and in the evenings

Safeguarding - repenting on past failures and redoubling efforts to implement good practice. However the recommended completely independent process and staffing [option 4] was rejected. The Church will be moving towards greater independence with work on the 'legal and practical requirements' of this [option 4], but endorsing option 3 [with Diocesan staffing and oversight] in the meanwhile.

Progress on Racial Justice was discussed with an affirmation that further effort needs to be made to embed racial justice in the life and practice of the church. The Diocese and Churches were asked to take special notice of this.

Guests from Lutheran Church of Estonia and the Anglican Church of Canada spoke well and passionately of how the Church of England provides support and succour to other world Christians.

Working Class Ministry, motion proposed by Rev Alex Frost from Blackburn, was debated, recognising both the strengths of working class people in the Church both clergy and lay and the difficulties that they face in our churches. The church will look at a strategy to support working class people in their vocations.

A report on the 'Living in Love and Faith' discussions was given by Bishop Martin of Leicester. It is intended that proposals will be taken to the July Synod.

Clergy Conduct Measure made changes in how clergy for the Royal Peculiars are brought into line with those for Dioceses. It received final approval from Synod and the Measure will now be considered in Parliament.

Registrar and Chancellor's fees were set; there were considerable differences between Dioceses, with Southwell and Nottingham's being mid range.

'Growing younger and more diverse' was a motion from Kenson Li - one of the youngest members of Synod - looked to support 18-25 year olds in the church with 3-5 young people being co-opted to Synod.

Changes to the Crown Nominations and Vacancy in See Committees will mean that any one particular church/cathedral can only have one representative on Committee. These Committees are the ones that decides on two names for a new Bishop to be proposed to the Prime Minister. A requirement that at least one clergy and one lay representative elected from the Vacancy in See Committee to the Crown Nominations Commission must be female was successfully proposed by the Bishop of London. There was an amendment to stop this and Bishop Sarah was visibly upset by the opposition to this, something that got national attention.

There were some alterations to the Mission and Pastoral Measure. This has been a big job although it has now gone to the revision stage and will come back with the Regulations. The Measure itself is quite controversial with changes to suspensions of presentation, the "fallow" proposal, and simplifying church buildings closures amongst other things. the latter will come back for adoption to Synod later this year.

The 'Distribution of Funds' was not debated due to the time constraint and the call to support clergy stipends and supporting parish ministry deferred - although the Church is required to 'pay particular regard' to supporting parish ministry as a successful amendment by Marcus Walker to the Governance Measure. Future dates for 2027-2029 were also deferred as Synod ran out of time but will be considered in July

Mitre and always achieving a very positive review. The governing body is now almost up to a full complement, particularly since Jon has joined as a foundation governor. Each month one class from the school visits Connections and this is greatly appreciated by most of the older people, we continue to look for ways to integrate the children more with the Connections' people. Most weeks one of our leadership team leads Collective Worship in the school on a Wednesday and the interactions are enjoyed by all. During the year one teacher left the school and was replaced by a new, male, teacher and he seems to be fitting in well.

Looking forward, we aim to develop the link which has been made with Kiwafu Primary school in Uganda to create understanding of the different cultures across the two schools. We continue to have four members of the church on the governing body.

We are very thankful for the dedication of the Home Group leaders in leading studies on a regular basis and for those who host the meetings mostly in homes. Groups tend to meet on a fortnightly basis but flexibly to account for holidays etc. Most Groups follow a set course to study books in the Bible, People in the Bible or a DVD based course such as *The Chosen*.

Our Vision:

To encourage church members to attend a Home Group where they will be welcomed, get to know each other better, share fellowship and encourage one another as we seek to strengthen our love and faith in Jesus.

Although support for mission has continued through our links with CMS, CPAS and the Lira, Uganda, projects, mission group has met only rarely. There have been good developments within these three mission areas, with Tim and Miranda making good use of their new Place of Springs resource for supporting their mission debriefings. CPAS were, of course, very involved in Jon's recruitment and their support was invaluable. The Lira projects are twofold; UCI (Uganda Christian Institute) used the donations we sent to buy 20 computers for students to use; the donations to Keframa, in addition to Keframa School Build, enabled the building of new accommodation for girl students within the new school site to give them better security. A number of Trinity members sponsor individual students at Keframa High School.

The HT mission fund has continued to build up and a major part of the next year's effort will be to make good use of this resource. Our vision for the future of mission group is to keep up the profile of mission support within Holy Trinity and to grow the reach of the mission fund.

Living with Loss

Meeting every 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month in the Stanley Room, the second year of Living with Loss – intended to support those dealing with any sort of bereavement – has continued to provide a safe space for people to share and to talk. It is very helpful that it happens when church is already open for Connections, and people often stay for lunch afterwards. So far it has mainly helped members of the fellowship who have lost loved ones, and typically numbers up to 6.

It was set up two years ago with the aim of helping those who have lost a loved one whose funeral was at Trinity, and for a time it included one or two people in this category. This has not happened over the last year, so the vision moving forwards is to reach more people in the community, men as well as women, as a 'pre-evangelism' initiative. We would also welcome others who might occasionally lead it. We are not trained counsellors; the main requirement is a sensitive, listening ear.

I also thank Suzanne & Shelagh for co-leading the last prayer training session in September, with a focus on intercessory prayer, and to Jon for co-leading the prayer ministry focus on the Spirit on 5th April. We have recently welcomed Karen de Fraine, Diane Kelly and Caro & Peter May to the prayer ministry team.



There have been many answers to prayer and we give glory to God for this. It would be lovely to hear more shared across the fellowship in order to build each other up in our faith as well as giving the Lord His due credit.

Each house group has a prayer champion, linked to each other via WhatsApp, so that prayer requests can quickly be shared. We are careful to check consent and maintain appropriate levels of confidentiality.

We are currently reviewing ways in which both corporate prayer and small group prayer (e.g prayer triplets) can be encouraged. Please talk to Julie Barker if you wish to be linked up in a prayer triplet or you have ideas to share about whole church prayer, in person or online.

Our website has a section dedicated to prayer with lots of useful links, including the link to our private prayer wall which can be used to post prayers or give thanks for answered prayer. In the year ahead I hope to facilitate a visit to the "Eternal Wall of Answered Prayer" site near Birmingham.

Finally, but importantly, do plan ahead for our dedicated time of 10 days prayer during Thy Kingdom Come, 29th May—9th June.

I have also attended the diocesan conference on safeguarding, where the new National Standards were introduced. I am currently attending monthly training on each of the standards . The National Standards are broad statements of what the Church of England wants to achieve in the most important dimensions of its safeguarding work. Now more than ever it is vital that the church is transparent and has the highest standards for safeguarding to avoid mistakes and errors in the past and I am excited to be part of this work.

We have been encouraged by the attendance of some of our Toddler families at the recent Kids and Families fun times on every 3rd Sunday at 4 pm.

What is our vision for the future:-

To continue to be a safe place showing God's love and care for all who come. To encourage families to join us at K&F fun times. To add in more Christian songs to our repertoire. To discuss with the church possible sessions to invite people to eg:- Dad's and Toddlers (Saturday am) and cheese and wine evenings with a speaker.

How in our ministry have we seen the vision implemented ?

We would like to continue to encourage parents/grandparents/carers to come to church social events, quiz nights and Kids and Family Fun times. There have been several families from Toddlers that have come to K&F recently. We are always looking for ways to engage in conversations and deepen our relationships with our families.

It is necessary to be thinking of new and exciting things to do although we are restricted by lack of accessible storage space.

How do we see it being built upon ?

Toddlers is always at its best when we have enough helpers to chat with people and clear up at the end. Please continue to pray for us, for safety each week, for health and for sharing God's love and care with those we meet and talk to.

Kids & Families Fun Time

This was launched in late spring 2025. Over the preceding year, numbers for our 4pm service had dwindled to almost none. It was clear that people were not attracted to come to a 'service' as such. After much thought and prayer, plus some consultation, Shelagh Baird-Smith and I began a very informal time of



play, craft activities, and food, with the gentle inclusion of a Christian focus, e.g. thanking God for the harvest in September. Numbers have fluctuated widely, from single figures of children, plus adults, to almost 50. On several occasions the inclusion of a bouncy castle has proved very popular.

Children come from the Toddler group, Holy Trinity Infant School, and the Youth Café (Ks2, 7-11s). At Christmas it took the form of a Scratch Nativity on Christmas Eve, which attracted 20 children plus assorted adults. We finish with a short word about the theme (e.g. God's love, Creation) and a prayer. Although it cannot be described as a new worshipping community, it is aimed at providing a next step towards faith, following on from Toddlers, and is ably supported by many of the fantastic Toddler team.

Moving forward, the vision is to find a way for some families to come to faith. The Fun Times may be a step along the way to an enquirers group, or some other opportunity for faith to be explored more meaningfully, as we look to becoming a multigenerational church again. We are seriously thinking of buying a bouncy castle, too!
